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On the Loss of a Pastor . . .

WHERE IS GOD?

Almost everyone, at some time in their life, will experience stress, trial, disappointment or defeat. It may even seem as if things are out of control, that things famil-



iar to us in our daily lives are changing faster than we can cope with them.

These things occur to us as individuals, and surely as whole church congregations as well.

At the time we went to press, there were approximately six vacancies in deaf ministry in various regions of the country. The North Dakota area seems to be the longest, more than eight or nine years without a full time pastor. The Kansas District is also vacant for a long time now, the last full time pastor being the late Rev. LaVern Mass. This vacancy not only affects the Greater Kansas City area, but also areas of Wichita, Olathe, Emporia, Topeka and others.

In the Atlantic District, we have St. Matthew and St. Mark (Elmhurst and Manhattan respectively) which have been struggling without a full time shepherd and guided with the help of laymen. Trinity Lutheran Church in Pittsburgh is presently served by only a vicar and Alpha in Rochester, N.Y. is vacant, following the departure of Rev. David Boyd, who accepted a call to California.

The loss of a pastor can surely create situations of confusion and uncertainty. Some of us may even feel lost or orphaned. Many will be asking, "Where is God?" At times like these some are going to wonder, "If God were here, these things would not be happening." Or they might think, "If God cared . . ." or, "If I were closer to God, or more obedient to God I would be spared all this doubt, uncertainty, and pain." And the church members might be feeling, "If only we can find the right pastor, everything will be OK. It is our fault we have not found the right man soon enough. So we must work harder, or seek God's will with more dedication and determination."

For some people, the assumption behind all this may be that God cannot accomplish His will for us unless we find out what His will is. This kind of thinking assumes that God cannot act properly or bless us unless we act in a certain way. There may even be belief that things that have happened in the past and calls that have been made were not a part of God's perfect will; that they were mistakes, and our confusion is a sign that we have failed.

None of these assumptions are true! God is omnipotent, meaning He is all-powerful. He is also omniniscient (He knows all things) and God is also omnipresent (He is every-where). He rules in everything, and His perfect will is being accomplished. If we feel unsettled or confused, it is not because God is, too. God is not dependent upon us for anything, least of all to accomplish His purposes. We read in Romans 8:28 "In all things God works for the good of those who love Him, who are called according to His purpose" and this means that God is able to turn any circumstance to good, and that He is able to accomplish His will no matter how desperate it might be . . . or even "impossible." He is able to make defeat change into victory!

The death of Christ on the cross was not an accident. From all appearances, it might look as a spectacular defeat for God. But in God's plan, it was the greatest of vicPage 2

NEW EDITOR AND BUSINESS MANAGER Sought for deaf lutheran

Believing that change and an infusion of new blood and fresh ideas can be very beneficial to our nearly 90 year old publication known as THE DEAF LUTHERAN, both Editor Lester Ahls abd Business Manager Elmer D. Francisco submitted their resignations to the Board of Directors at their regular meeting in St. Louis April 12-14. The joint announcement provides the board with a rare opportunity to select a new team to staff the paper with two persons who can work well together. The resignations are to be effective on July 6, 1997, at the conclusion of the convention in the St. Louis.

Francisco has many years of board experience, having been President-elect and President for two terms, treasurer for three terms and serving as business manager for 17 years for the paper. He has also served in many capacities in his home congregation in Spokkane, Wash. and the Northwest Regional ILDA Conference.

Ahls has been involved in the ILDA since 1976, serving as Regional President; ILDA Secretary, President-elect and President. He will end 14 years as Editor next year.

THE DEAF LUTHERAN has been in continous publication since the year 1909. At the turn of the century, early members of the deaf ministry shared a paper with a German language paper, Der Lutheraner" which as one might surmise, created some problems with the ability to read German. It was not for

ILDA BOARD MEETS IN ST. LOUIS

The first meeting of the Executive Committee and Board of Directors since the last ILDA convention in Schaumburg, Ill. last year occurred in St. Louis at Concordia Seminary April 12-14. All elected members of the board were present with the exception of Richard Sharp, who was replaced by former board member Victor Lyon of the Northwest Region. Synodical representative Dr. Rodney Rynearson attended only the first session, as illness of his wife Rhoda required that he be at home.

Much of the business at hand dealt with the upcoming 1997 convention, which will be held in St. Louis. It approved a request from Chapel for the Deaf in Charlotte, N.C. to host the 2001 meeting after Cleveland, Ohio in 1999.

1997 combination ticket prices have been set at \$93.00, however, early birds can save \$13 if paid by Dec. 31, 1996. Costs increase to \$87.00 until April 30, 1997. After that date, the full combination ticket will be charged. Hotel rooms are very nice and also quite pricey at \$85. It does not matter if one person occupies a room or as many as four, the cost is the same. To save money, members and visitors are encouraged to share in order to save on expenses. If hotel rooms are paid for by Dec. 31, 1996 and the money forwarded to the convention chairperson, one can save on the hotel room tax, which will further reduce the convention costs. Moneys forwarded to the hotel headquarters will not receive this benefit.

The last convention of the ILDA in Schaumburg, III. set 1995-1997 Mission Projects at \$31,000. It was announced that as of April 13, 1996 the fund stood at \$13,822.03 or approximately 44.6% of the goal. The Board of Directors was informed that the largest of the projects to be funded during the current biennium, the India Lutheran Church, Hosur, to purchase a tract of land for a new school for \$20,000 might need to be moved up quickly in order to take advantage of current costs before any increase later. A motion to do this was carried unanimously by the board.

A letter from Rev. Donald Zuhn to members of the Steering Committee of the next Convocation of Deaf Ministry was shared by Lester Ahls, one of its members. In planning for the next Convocation, Pastor Zuhn stated that new rules by the AAL require the sponsoring organization to supply at least 25% of the project costs compared with last time when it was 10%. The problem, it was explained, is that there would be a shortfall of \$4,250. Could the ILDA supply this? Inasmuch as the ILDA is sponsoring this convocation, which is expected to occur in the Fall of 1997, the board gave its blessing and it was also carried.

Three young men studing for the ministry at Concordia Seminary and planning to serve the deaf after graduation attended one of the sessions.They were David Neilson, Tim Eckert and Cory Eckstrom. All three received scholarships of \$750 each.

The board discussed having workshops during the convention. Different topics came up, but the one generating the most interest and support was the need for Home Study. Bible Classes allow persons to stop and ask questions; it permits feedback, something one can seldom do during formal worship.

It was announced that the roster of members in the God's 1,000 club stands at 154 members. As envisioned when created several years ago, the club would have 1,000 members each of whom would donate 10 dollars annually. This fund would be enough to cover all board expenses, thus freeing up more funds to support mission projects. The club will have its dinner at 12 noon on Saturday, July 5, 1997. Memberships can be obtained by forwarding the dues to Treasurer Russel L. Healey, P.O. Box 223, Olive Branch, Ill. 62969.

The 1997 ILDA Convention theme will be, "I am the Gateway." The theme is very appropriate this time, because the Adams Mark hotel, the convention headquarters, is very close to the famed Arch, the "gateway to the west." In fact, the view from the terrace on the 18th floor provides a marvelous view of the Arch and the Mississippi River in the background. One can take a walk down there, visit a museum under the Arch, depicting events leading to the conquest of the west. If you wish, you can take the elevator to the top of the Arch, 630 feet above the ground level, for a nominal charge.

The 1997 ILDA Convention dates are July 3, 4, 5 and 6. Besides the business sessions, there will be an election of officers to guide the Association over the next two years. Your input and support are very important.If you would like further information, write or call:

I pointed out to the Board people that often we put the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit all together in one place in our signing. I emphasized that our God is a tri=3 une=1 God. And for us to be good witnesses to other deaf people who may associate all three just as separate gods or lumped together under only a God, I find it easy to describe God by an inverted triangle.



In that way I can always show which person of the Trinity that I am talking about. Every time I talk about God the Father, I use my left hand raised to heaven to show Him. And every time I talk about Jesus, I use my right hand raised to heaven to show Him. And when I talk about the Holy Spirit, I use both my hands palm up in front of me in the center to show Him. I have noticed some deaf Lutheran people talking about God the Father and God the Son using their left hand for both of them. To me, that can be confusing. Since ASL (American Sign Language) allows us to place people and things then why not use good ASL when we are talking about our God and especially talking about the Three Persons of our God.

The first meeting of the International Lutheran Deaf Association Board of Directors of the 1995-1997 term were held on the beautiful campus of the Concordia Seminary in St. Louis, Mo.April 12-14, 1996. Present were: Larry Gorton, President; Dennis Konkel, President-elect; Alice L. Hagemeyer, Secretary; Russel Healey, Treasurer and the Rev. Don Leber, pastoral adviser. On hand were a representative from each of the seven regions, James Cheese, Eastern; Lee Ann Kotal, Pacific; Richard Norton, Dixie; Pam Kane, Great Lakes; Linda Desrosiers, Midwest and Victor Lyon for the Northwest. Also Lester Ahls and Elmer Francisco, staff members of THE DEAF LUTHERAN; Rev. Mark A. Anderson, co-chair of the 1995 convention and Sharon Schwarz, chairperson for the 1997 convention.

The Rev. Rodney Rynearson of the LCMS Mission was with the group Friday evening presenting an update on his activities and recent visit to India where he unfortunately became infected with malaria. Because he has not yet fully recovered, he asked to be excused from the rest of the sessions.

HIGHLIGHTS OF MEETING

Rev. Mark Anderson, 1995 ILDA Convention co-chair, announced a profit of \$11,893.00 from the last convention. He commended the excellent cooperation of all four churches in Chicago area in making it the success it was.

Dennis Konkel and his law committee have been making many changes for the 25-year-old organization that now needs a face lift to keep up with the times. The proposed changes; will be ready for approval within 90 days of the next ILDA convention.

Lee Ann Kotal, chair for the scholarship committee, introduced three seminary students who had been granted scholarships. There was a wave of hand for each man as their names were called and best wishes for wherever they might be sent.

The board approved the application of Chapel for the Deaf/Lutheran of Charlotte, N.C. to host the 2001 convention.

Lester Ahls, editor and Elmer Francisco, business manager of THE DEAF LUTHERAN surprised everyone with the announcements of their plans to resign their positions at the end of the 1997 ILDA convention. Although we are sad to see them go, we must now look for new people who are capable of taking up their reins.

We have voted to take out \$20,000 from the 1995-1997 ILDA Mission Projects treasury to pay in advance to the India Lutheran Church in Hosur so that its authorities can buy land right away when the price is low.

A committee will be formed to study the structural problem of the Dixie Region.

A Speakers Bureau for the ILDA will be established. A list of ILDA members with expertise in various area of church service, i.e., teaching, training, lecturing and using appropriate tools for efficient worship, Bible study, hymns and public relations would be handy.

The most exciting part of the meeting was a tour of the Adams Mark Hotel, the site of 1997 ILDA convention in downtown St. Louis. This beautiful hotel is located just across from the famous Arch. Sharon Schwarz and her committee promise us all that this convention will be something no one will want to miss. There will be some activites for children and young adults. All ILDA members are urged to make plans to take a vacation in St. Louis the first week of July in 1997. Lutherans or not, everyone is welcome to register for the four exciting days of worship, Bible reading, fellowship and much more.

CALL FOR NOMINATIONS

The ILDA Nomination Committee, which is currently chaired by former President Ronald L. Madding, wishes to remind all Regional Conference secretaries of the need to nominate persons at their conferences this year who will run for national ILDA office next year at St. Louis. Mr. Madding wishes this information sent to him no later than 60 days following the adjournment of this year's conferences.

The following changes in the **ILDA HANDBOOK** are noted:

ARTICLES IX, Section A1, The President: "The President is in the second part of his term and may not be re-elected. However, he may later serve a second term as President-elect or President." Therefore, President Larry Gorton will be leaving his post, after serving two years (one term) according to the above changes.

Section B2, The President-elect, which states, "The President-elect, which states, "The President-elect's term of office is the first two-year part of his service. At the end of this time he automatically becomes president for two years. . . Therefore, Presidentelect Dennis Konkel will complete his first two-year part, then automatically becomes president for two years. The president-elect position will become vacant next year. We will need to elect a new candidate at the 1997 ILDA conventions."

ARTICLES XVIII, The nominationg Committee, Section B-Responsibilities; "... at least two months before the scheduled regional meeting, the secretary shall remind the congregations to offer names for nomination which shall then be voted on at the regional conference."
