## An Editorial . . . CHRISTMAS IS COMING

It's not hard to tell that Christmas is coming. This is being written in mid-September and we are already seeing Christmas merchandise being put up in the stores. And the annual "Christmas Appeals" are already showing up in my mail box. Trying to get into the spirit of Christmas when the temperature outdoors is still in the mid-70's is not very easy to do. But since most of our readers will not see this until around Thanksgiving time, we will talk a little about Advent.

How easy it would be to get so wrapped up in Christmas preparations that we forget all about the importance of Advent. What a great loss that would be! We need Advent to understand Christmas. Only someone who has been in prison for a long time knows the full meaning of freedom. No one celebrates liberty like someone who has been a slave. Only one who has fully experienced Advent understands the real meaning of Christmas.

Advent calls us first of all to a time of waiting. We wait for God to fulfill His promise. Israel had to wait for nearly two thousand years for the promise of the Messiah to be fulfilled. Yet, "in the fullness of time" according to God's own timing, He sent forth His son. For over nineteen centuries the church has been waiting for Christ tc fulfill His promise to return. The longer the wait, the deeper our longing.

With the waiting, Advent calls for a time of reflection and should include some time for serious meditation upon the reasons why Christ came. That meditating should include some thought as to why the Son of God would give up the splendor and adoration of His home in heaven and submit Himself to the discomfort, dishonor, suffering and death here on earth? Someone who has pondered in his heart the awesome sacrifice that God made and a love that is beyond human understanding can truly appreciate the true meaning of Christmas.

Like the Lenten Season, Advent also calls us to repentance, and to remember the reason God sent forth His Son. It should cause us to consider the terrible prospect of an angry God coming to judge and our casual indifference to our sinful way of life. It should horrify and dismay us and cause us to be moved to a more God pleasing life. Alas, our culture craves instant satisfaction; it has no use for meditation and even less for wait-

ing. And repentance? No need for that, either. So the world bypasses Advent and heads for the partying, gifts and food. But truthfully, only Christians who have experienced the depths of Advent can know the heights of Christmas. Only they understand the birth of the Saviour, who is none other

than out Lord Jesus Christ. May God grant each and every one of us a rich and rewarding Advent Season and may the coming of Christ fill our hearts with new joy . . . a story that never becomes old and is ever new.

Why is attendance at worship not very important to some deaf people? One of the most valuable gifts that God gives to HIS people is the gift of worship. Maybe you never thought about it that way, but it is true. Think back to the Old Testament. God wanted to help HIS people remember that HE is always with them, and thus God gave directions to Moses about the way to build the Tabernacle or tent church. Every time they moved, the people took the tent down and carried it to the next place and set up the tent church again. And God was with them. Then when they arrived at the Promised land, there was no more need for a tent church and God gave to King Solomon the job of building the permanent temple.

Again, God showed HIS people that HE was always with them there. # CONVOCATION ON DEAF MINISTRY

After more than two years of planning, it can finally be announced that the 1997 Convocation on Deaf Ministry will take place on the dates of Oct. 3, 4 and 5 at the Saviour Pastoral Center in Kansas City, Kan.

The Midwest Conference held a meeting there six or seven years ago and it is an excellent facility and should be adequate for our needs.

The last convocation was held in Madison, Wis., in November, 1981 and plans were made then to hold another such meeting "within 10 years" but time has a way of passing us by rather quickly. A new millenium will be upon us in less than four years and one of the purposes of the meeting will be to make preparations for deaf ministry in the 21st century.

A grant fron Aid Association for Lutherans (AAL) for \$35,000 and another from Mill Neck Foundation for \$15,000 to the International Lutheran Deaf Association (ILDA) made the convocation possible. The ILDA, the sponsoring organization, put up the remaining funds to insure that the meeting could be held.

Additional details will be announced as they become available.

# **ABOUT RECENT CHURCH BURNINGS**

Jesus says,". . . on this rock I will build My Church, and the forces of Hell will not prevail (overpower) it." (Matthew 16:18).

We have recently seen in the news about the many church buildings that have been burned. Many of these churches are made up primarily of African-American Christians. It is a sad and terrible thing to learn about these fires. Why would someone want to burn a house of worship?

Unfortunately, it is nothing new. As we read through the Bible, we read how the Old Testament temple in Jerusalem was destroyed by the evil King Nebichadnezzar. The temple was finally rebuilt, but then it was destroyed again in the year 70 A.D. Through the years, many church buildings, temples and houses of worship have been destroyed. plete its process of purchasing 2.14 acres of land near the watch factory in Hosur. The land will cost about \$18,000 and the remaining amount used to build a wall and get utilities.

The plan is to use the land for a church building, dormitories for men and women, craft shops, a library, and housing for the pastor. The facility will provide a center where the deaf can go to learn jobs, and where deaf and hearing can go to learn more about Christian outreach with deaf persons.
