DEAF LUTHERAN DEVOTION

Read Matthew 28:1-10

Today while I was sitting in a Bible Study class (this shows you that even a pastor has a lot to learn) I learned some new facts about the resurrection of Jesus. First of all the tomb in which Jesus' body was placed was a brand new tomb that no one had used in the past. It was the Jewish rule that only one person could be buried in a tomb. If a 2nd person wanted to be buried in the same tomb, that would make the 2nd person unclean according to Jewish rules. For Joseph of Arimathea to donate his own tomb for Jesus' body, that was a tremendous gift because the tombs were very expensive. It also meant that Joseph had to go and find a different tomb for himself.

Secondly, on Easter Sunday an angel was sent by God to roll away the stone from the entrance of the tomb. The angel did NOT do that to let Jesus out. Jesus arose from the dead by HIS own power. And Jesus was already out of the tomb by the time the angel arrived because we find HIM down the road meeting the women on their way back to Jerusalem. Notice that the angel rolled away the stone just before the women arrived at the tomb. The stone was removed so that the women and the disciples and that also you and I can look in and see the empty grave and know that Jesus really did arise and become alive as HE said HE would do.

Thirdly, Jesus commanded the women to go and tell the disciples. This is almost the same command Jesus gave to all the disciples in verse 19. They were to go and tell all people about

Jesus suffering, death, and resurrection. This is Jesus command to us today. Through our reading the Bible and studying God's Word together as Christian people we look into the tomb and we believe that Jesus is our Lord and Savior. Now that makes a **B I G** difference in our lives and we want to go and tell and show people how much God loves them as HE loves us. Some people only come and look in the tomb and never say a word to anyone or demonstrate the love of Jesus in their life. They don't give their time or their offerings or their life to the Lord and so they will not receive the benefits of believing in the true arising of Jesus from the dead. In a Jewish family when a son was old enough to become married the father would go to a neighbor that had a daughter ready for marriage and the two fathers would arrange for the marriage. There would be a price that the boy's father would pay to the girl's father for the bride. When the price was agreed upon, then the boy would hand a cup of wine to the girl and she would make the final decision to drink from the cup and agree to give herself to this man as her husband or to refuse to drink and wait for another family to come to her father. Jesus paid the price by suffering and dying on the cross for you and me, and every time we go to the Lord's Supper and eat HIS body and drink HIS blood we are agreeing to be HIS bride (The Bible calls the Church - HIS bride). That means we give our life, all we have to HIM, as our Lord, our Savior, and our God. Remember that the next time you go to the Lord's Supper.

Bible Class Videos for Deaf Children in Sign Language

A cry has been heard from parents of deaf children for Christian education materials so that they can teach the children about Jesus either at home or at church. Many of the deaf children are mainstreamed into the public schools where there is no chance for them to learn of Jesus love. About two years ago, Pastor Darrell Matthews Missionary for the Deaf in the Rocky Mountain District heard the need and put together enough grant money to start this project moving. The first goal was to put together about 200 lessons on video and in sign language and captioned. The push came to put the entire Bible, Old and New Testament in Bible story form with lessons from various pastors and parents. So the goal suddenly got bigger. The goal now is to put 75 series of lessons on video in sign language. Each series has between 3 to 7 lessons depending upon the Bible stories. At the present time the entire Old Testament has been finished and are presently being edited and captioned by Silent Word Productions in River Forest. This is an example of what a

series will look like: Creation Week, 6 lessons; The Fall, 4 lessons; Cain and Abel, 4 lessons; The World Before the Flood, 5 lessons; etc. By this coming summer they should be available for only the cost of materials and shipping. At that time they will also be made available through the internet.

The story tellers for the lessons are Pastor Bud Palmer from Wisconsin and Barbara Lanmann from Mill Neck, New York. Our teachers are Pastor Don Leber from California, Pastor Ron Friedrich from Texas, and Pastor Darrell Matthews from Colorado. Pastor Matthews is the Director of the Project under Bethel Deaf TV Ministries, Inc. Iocated in Littleton, Colorado.

Greetings to you who are across the wide ocean.

Life in Ghana continues to be an adventure! We are writing quickly now as we have power. The Volta Lake, where the electric generators for the country are, has gotten seriously low. (Also three of the seven turbines are not working) Thus the Ghana Electric Association has announced that there is not enough power for the country. In some areas they are doing 12 hours on and 12 hours off for electricity. Here in Kumasi they are doing 24 hours on and 24 hours off. The first few time it took some getting used to, but now we are adjusting fine.

This means we cannot keep much in our refrigerator as it does not keep it cool during the 24 hours off. The first day we had to eat the meat from our little freezer so it would not spoil. We also moved some to the Mission House close to us as they have a generator and use that every few hours to keep things cool and to do a little work. (Most generators here only have enough fuel for four to five hours, so they cannot be run continuously) We also need to watch the water as when the power is off at the pumping station, there is no water pressure. So we try to keep our tank as full as possible.

Other challenges that have come up with the power rationing are: communication - hard to call someone if either you or they do not have electricity, thus e-mail and faxes are equally hard; shopping must be some each day or every other day so the food does not spoil, not much for leftovers; having our meetings and Bible Classes with the Evangelists has been a challenge, we have had many by candlelight and kerosene lantern; we have borrowed a gas burner(just like camping out) as our stove is electric really surprised us when it would not work with the power off HAHA. With a few adjustments to work around the power, things continue to move along.

We are continuing the training with the Evangelists. We have slowed down a little to work through the course on Lutheran Confessions using the Book of Concord. With the varying work schedules of the evangelists I have meetings almost every morning and most evenings during the week and on Saturdays. Monday is usually the day I prepare the



lessons and work ahead. We have also started to do goal setting to move ahead with ideas for the ministry in Kumasi.

In the village of Adomrobe we recently saw the story of the rich man and Lazarus from the Bible (Luke 16). An older deaf man in the village died, buried the next day, short funeral time. He did not have much money. But he was baptized, one wife, and attending our services regularly. An older man from the village also died. He was an important man in the area, lots of money, three wives, a big idol worshipper. They froze his body to keep for four week so that the funeral could be arranged. They had music and dancing all day and night before the burial (almost like a wedding in the states). We were allowed to greet the chiefs gathered for the funeral and see the body of the man. He was covered in Kente cloth, gold rings on his fingers, and gold dust sprinkled on his face. Now you know the story - which one do you think is in Heaven?

We see many things everyday that remind us how God has blessed us. And we thank Him for this opportunity to come here and be a part of this ministry and spread the Gospel. We want to thank all of you who are praying for us and supporting us - we very much appreciate it! We enjoy the letters and email you send, thank you. It really brightens our day to receive things in the mail. Please continue to pray for us and keep in contact.

But now we have a generator that allows us to have power for some time during the day - just enough to keep our fridge going. The Lord does provide!

For Your Information... DR. RUSSELL'S 'BIBLE DIET'

Finally!—a book about diet, nutrition, and healthy living written with wit, humor, and Biblical wisdom by a Christian medical doctor.

This new, best-selling book—What The Bible Says About Healthy Living (Regal Books)—was written by Rex Russell, MD.

Improve your physical and mental health and lift your spirits. Dr. Russell recommends that you eat many of the natural foods which the folks in the Old and New Testament ate. Avoid the foods they avoided. He also recommends doing what those Biblical folks did—an occasional short fast.

Dr. Russell is 56. He interned at the Mayo Clinic, and now is a radiologist at Sparks Regional Medical Center in Fort Smith, AR.

So how did a Southern Baptist, cattle-raising, Mayo Clinic-trained radiologist come to study and recommend "Dr. Russell's Bible Diet"?

In 1976, Russell's long-standing diabetes was worsening. He also was suffering from chronic abscesses, arthritis, swelling in his legs, and deterioration of his arteries, eyesight, and kidneys.

Because I'm a doctor, I searched for medical answers with many physicians," he says, "but illness and confusion continued.

"One evening in desperation I pulled a Bible off the shelf. In Psalm 139:14, the psalmist praises God because 'I am fearfully and wonderfully made.' I said: 'If we are so wonderfully made, why am I so sick? God, why didn't You give us a way to be healthy?'"

He received this answer: "Rex, have you really read my Instruction Book?"

Dr. Russell began to study about faith. Searching the Bible, he discovered not only spiritual laws related to health, but also dietary and physical principles. So he changed his life style and ate more natural foods. After four years his health improved.

Although he still is dependent on insulin, he has not had an abscess or symptom of arthritis in 20 years. He now has 20/20 vision. His overall health has improved in every respects, he says.

Meanwhile, Dr. Russell studied a lot of ongoing medical research that confirmed that many of the dietary recommendations and restrictions found in the Old and New Testament have a scientific basis.

Although he's not a vegetarian, this physician/cattleman believes "most people in the United States would benefit from eating less meat. Only 5% of his daily calories comes from meat.

Dr. Russell also recommends that people avoid caffish, as well as pork.

The folks in the Bible, he says, ate meat only once in a while, and considered meat "a celebration food," eaten only for special occasions.

In a chapter titled "Mom was right: Eat your fruits and veggies," Dr. Russell recommends a diet with plenty of fresh fruits and vegetables, grains, seeds, and beans.

Eat some garlic, too. Medical research shows that garlic lowers bad cholesterol levels significantly, lowers high blood pressure, and protects people from infections.

Another prominent Biblical food, olive oil, has a beneficial effect on health, especially in preventing hardening of the arteries.

Dr. Russell recommends three principles which he believes will improve a person's health. "They are not a cure-all," he says, "but I believe they will help all."

—Eat the foods God created for you.

—As much as possible, eat fresh fruits and vegetables. —Avoid food addictions.

Dr. Russell has three other suggestions to improve one's health:

1) Exercise regularly. "The Bible says: 'By the sweat of your brow you will eat your food.' (Gen. 3:19). Because most of us no longer work in the fields for our food, physical exercise should be substituted. It is my belief that we need enough exercise to work up a sweat six days a week."

2) Don't forget to smile. "Both the giver and the receiver of a smile benefit through the release of prostaglandins. These substances help balance the hormonal functions of the body."

3) Everything in moderation (so said the Apostle Paul).

This physician, fascinated by the relationship of mind and body, remembers what the Apostle Paul said 2,000 years ago: "All of you surely know that you are God's temple and that His Spirit lives in you."
