Matthews 1:18

This is how the birth of Jesus Christ came about: His mother Mary was pledged to be married to Joseph, but before they came together, she was found to be with child through the Holy Spirit.¹⁹ Because Joseph her husband was a righteous man and did not want to expose her to public disgrace, he had in mind to divorce her quietly. ²⁰ But after he had considered this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because what is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. ²¹ She will give birth to a son, and you are to give him the name Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins." ²² All this took place to fulfill what the Lord had said through the prophet: ²³ "The virgin will be with child and will give birth to a son, and they will call him Immanuel" —which means, "God with us." 24 When Joseph woke up, he did what the angel of the Lord had commanded him and took Mary home as his wife.²⁵ But he had no union with her until she gave birth to a son. And he gave him the name Jesus.

I recently purchased a book called "The Jesus I Never Knew" by Philip Yancey. In the book it talks about "Who HE was", "Why HE came", and "What HE Left Behind". I have just begun reading the first chapter and it has stirred up ideas in my mind and I know it will also in yours. Think back in your life growing up about all the ideas you had about Jesus. Remember the song, "Jesus Loves Me This I Know!" And remember the table prayer, "Come Lord Jesus Be our Guest!" And remember the bedtime prayer, "Now I Lay Me Down To Sleep!" Maybe you even have a picture at home of Jesus with the children. These are all wonderful, beautiful images that we have of Jesus. Then we have some of the new modern movie images of Jesus as we see

in the movies "The Gospel According to St. Matthew" by Pasolini and "Jesus of Nazareth" by Franco Zepharelli. Everyone has their opinion of Jesus, their idea of how Jesus looked. As you read the four Gospels, Matthew, Mark, Luke and John you can find avery different kind of Jesus. Jesus was often frustrated with people, Jesus often was lonely even though HE had the 12 disciples with HIM because they did not fully understand HIS reason for being here, and only a few people felt comfortable around Jesus because HE could see right through you and HE would tell what you were thinking. Jesus always fellowshipped with the sinners, tax collectors, prostitutes of His world.

Today sinners often feel unloved by the church and its members. What has happened to us? Have our churches become like Deaf Clubs that exclude certain people? What is the vision of your congregation for 1999 and the future? The way most of our Deaf Lutheran churches are going right now in the near future there won't be any more churches because all the "members" will be dead and there will be no young deaf people to take their place. The Jesus I know is a God of LOVE (Read 1 John 4:8) and HE welcomes all people that come in humility confessing their sins into HIS kingdom. Our job as servants of the King is to reach out to deaf children and their families, to young deaf couples struggling to make their way in life, to deaf people with nose studs, ear studs, tongue studs, and even tatoos, and to senior ciizen deaf people that are lonely. On my desk I have a picture of Jesus that always reminds me of HIM and what HE did for me, so that I will always remember what I should be doing for HIM. I hope this picture will be and encouragement for you.

Jennifer Knaack— Deaf Lay Volunteer Missionary in Macau

Jennifer Knaack is a deaf student at Gallaudet University. Her parents, Rev William and Diane Knaack serve deaf congregations in northern Minnesota and Wisconsin. Jennifer raised her own money and will spend the year in Macau, helping the mission serve deaf people there. Below is her first e-mail to her parents.

It's now my third day in Macau. It's HOT!! Palm trees and tropical plants. It's the tropics here! I've never drank so much water in one day before. It's also beautiful here. Mountains everywhere and Macau is a really beautiful city when I come across the bridge from the islands. Most of the buildings are white and pastel colored. Macau is set against a backdrop of really high hills—they are probably about 10 times bigger than Rib Mountain! !

People drive on the wrong side of the road! I had to get into the driver's seat and Dunseth was driving on the passenger side. It was funny. In Macau, people drive crazy. The city's roads curve, dip, and rise all over—no straight, flat roads. And they are really narrow. Only one lane for each direction.

My apartment is in a "cute" location because when I come out of it, there's a whole street of shop—a flower shop where I can buy a whole bunch of flowers for about 1 dollar, markets, clothes, etc. All of those shops are outside. It's so different.

The view from [Pastor Tom] Dunseth's house is incredible. I can see mountains all around me and the ocean. I can see roofs all over, houses really close together, but not organized. The roofs are all pointing in different directions. Some houses are almost collapsing, some are only one room, some are already broken but the government will not take them down due to "historical" value.

The house is near a village, it's soooo cute. Little stores, like the bread shop, the market where there's meat hanging and vegetables, fruit, a round park with palm trees, and little stores with things that are hanging outside—an old man is sitting inside and it looks really dark and he comes out and points at things and asks me if I want them. I tell him, "No"—very politely. So far, I can see that the people here are ok with Americans. I don't sense any hostility—some stares and a bit of amusement.

More News from Jennifer, November 3, 1998...

Greetings from Macau! I have been here in Macau for almost three months. When I first arrived in mid-August, many new and different things welcomed me. I want to share with you the rich experience God has given me.

What it is like here in Macau

The weather is still warm here! Over the past few weeks it has been in the lower 80's. The food is different, yes. A whole lot of rice. There were some surprises when I came here. The Chinese people don't like milk or cheese. They think it is very fattening. Chocolate is worse. They mostly don't like sweet

foods, only salty and fried food. Most of the people are thin and small. If you go to a Chinese restaurant in America, the food is similar. But here it's not as sweet. It tastes more plain and salty. It is very hard to find Mexican food here. There are many American foods on the shelves that I can buy, but all of the words are in Chinese! The environment is almost like the tropics. There are palm trees, monkeys in cages, tea trees, banana trees... I especially enjoy the parks in Macau. The scene is peaceful with elderly Chinese people doing their exercises, young ones playing, and others relaxing. There are various ponds with large orange goldfish and turtles. They are supposed to bring good luck. The paths are curved, because the Chinese believe that evil spirits can only walk straight. There are many temples and places to worship. I see many burning incense and fake money as a form of worship to their ancestors. The traffic here is crazy. There are hundreds of scooters and the cars are very small sized. Most people either walk, take the bus, or use scooters. People drive on the wrong side of the road! At intersections, there aren't that many traffic lights, so many people are trying to go in different directions at the same time. Amazingly, I haven't seen an accident yet. The air pollution here is pretty bad from all the traffic. The air is more fresh out on the two islands of Macau.

What I am doing

I have been working with the Deaf school and here's what I do: I have worship on Sundays with either the Chinese people or the mission team. On Mondays, I have the day off. On Tuesdays through Fridays, I sit in a religion class at the deaf school and help the deaf teacher explain the Bible lesson. On Tuesdays, I have choir practice with about 19 students We are now working on songs for worship on Wednesday mornings and we are preparing for the Christmas performance in December. On Wednesday mornings, there's a teachers' devotion and a morning prayer. After that, Rev. Dunseth does the two worship services, one with the older students and the other with the younger students. On Friday mornings, either Rev. Dunseth or I do the morning prayers and the kindergarten devotions. On Saturday mornings, I have an all-girls group since the majority of the deaf students are boys. I want the girls to have an opportunity to get together and have a small hands-on activity as well as a short Bible lesson. In the afternoons, the deaf students come to the English Center for a student fellowship. There's a song, Bible lesson, games, and food. The students really enjoy that.

Communication

What about sign language? When I first came here, I had to use many gestures and facial expressions to communicate. The Mascau Sign Language (MSL) is not the same as ASL (American Sign Language), although the body language and gestures are more of a Universal sign language. I have had to learn new vocabulary and methods of signing concepts and ideas. I have been learning pretty quickly because 1 go to the Macau Association of the Deaf (they just celebrated their 4-year anniversary last week) on Wednesday nights and join a group when they go bowling on Friday nights. I'm also becoming good friends with another deaf girl, Diana, who is the same age as I am. She was baptized last spring and is the first deaf student at Macau University. She has taught me about Macau culture and sign. There are very few people here in Macau who know some ASL, so I miss talking to someone using ASL! Rev. Dunseth has been using ASL to communicate with me and he translates for me during Bible studies or at meetings. Also, here, there are no TTYs, so many deaf people use fax machines. I have one in my apartment.

What's happening now

I am staying at an apartment on my own in a good location where I can go to the market which has many vegetables, meat, and flowers. There are food stores, restaurants, and shopping nearby. I have two male kittens, Caleb and Boaz keeping me company. I go running on the Guia Lighthouse hill two times a week. I have been going sightseeing and taking pictures. I get homesick sometimes because everything here is so different. Everything is in Chinese and I am in the city instead of the country. I miss my family .md my friends. I thank God that I

have e-mail and that I can write letters. I have been learning as I go along how to become a missionary and how to share the gospel with others who have a hard time believing. I have spent much time in prayer asking God to guide me and show me what I need to do here. I ask that you keep me in your prayers to ask God to give me a stronger faith and to be with me when times ~et hard. I will keep sending newsletters and let you know what's happening here in Macau. I want to thank all of you who have supported me and



prayed for me. Please keep in touch. Here is my address:
