ST. MARK LUTHERAN CHURCH OF BALTIMORE

St Mark Lutheran Church is a remnant of a flourishing church for the Deaf in the Baltimore area. I am not critical of St Mark Lutheran Church of the Deaf, because I understand Baltimore is a remnant of a city in the Northeast Corridor. Last year during the hurricane season, Baltimore citizens complained that the weather about hurricane Floyd, the biggest hurricane for Baltimore of the end of the century, was forecast by position in Washington, DC and Philadelphia (Baltimore sits about half way between the two).

The struggle that St. Mark Lutheran Church finds itself is certainly not unique to the area. It opens the doors of speculation for what creative ways may enhance the congregation. The City of Baltimore just approved a new police chief from New York City in order to bring down the crime rate. We at St. Mark Lutheran Church for the Deaf are creatively looking for a way to increase the attendance.

We are having our first Friendship Sunday June 18th during regular service and fellowship afterwards. It is a time to invite our friends and neighbors deaf and hearing to worship and fellowship with us.. We know that faith comes by hearing and hearing by the Word of God.

We are also praying and relying of the Spirit of God to increase the number of those who have faith as they come to hear.

Baltimore may not be the city of prominence it once was. And St. Mark Lutheran Church may not have the prominence it had among churches in DC and Philadelphia or Pittsburgh, but we know many people are hungry for the Word of God in the Baltimore area. They will not hear the Word of God in DC or Pennsylvania, They will hear the Word of God and be cared for by people in Maryland, in Baltimore County and The City of Baltimore. St. Mark Lutheran Church for the Deaf is Gods instrument for that purpose in this place. The miracle here is that the deaf hear through signs. Hallelujah and Amen.

I have not done any preaching except for the confirmation service for Julia Velasquez. I expect to be able to do more in the future.

We are currently also taking care of my mother-in-law. She has been in and out of the hospital since last December. It has been very rough on my wife. She is only able to work one day every week or two. The district has been very good to us paying my full salary for the first six months of my disability.

We have not wanted for anything. Praise the Lord. We ask you to please still keep us in your prayers, asking the Lord to give me complete recovery in my right hand and arm. We know that I have been able to do as good as I have only because of the many prayers of all our friends and family.

Happy New Year! I can't believe I've been here for a month already. The month of December was full of different activities. I'm picking up on the signs pretty good. The mission team and the students are fun to work with.

I am watching how Jennifer and Pastor Dunseth do Wednesday and Friday morning devotions. And I am also helping Jennifer teach a student, Wendy, things she needs to know before Pastor baptizes her.

On December 11th, we had a girl's group Pizza party. Jennifer and I ordered Pizza Hut for the girls. We all had fun sitting around eating and talking together. It was a great opportunity for me to watch the language in motion.

On Dec. 17th the high school students performed "The Old Shoe Cobbler" for the rest of the school, their parents, and the mission team. The performance was a success, everyone enjoyed it, and the students had a great time.

The "Old Shoe Cobbler" is about an old man who saw Jesus in a dream. Jesus said he will come to his house tomorrow. So the man got his house ready. As he sees needy people, he invites them in. He gives them warm clothes and food he planned to give to Jesus. Then he felt disappointed because Jesus never came. Later that night Jesus appeared again in the dream and said he was the needy people that the old man invited in and helped.

The students had the opportunity to perform again at the Lutheran Nursing Home on Coloane on December 23rd. Coloane is an island that is a part of Macau. The Nursing Home residents really appreciated the students performing.

The school was closed due to Christmas vacation starting December 17th until January 3rd. Jennifer and I had a slumber party for the girls' group on December 18th. We made cookies and bead angels, and did some Bible devotions together. A fun way to begin the Christmas season.

On December 19th at midnight Macau became part of China again. It was a big event that lasted for a few days. At about 11:30 the Portuguese flag was lowered and exactly at midnight the Chinese flag was raised. The following day at noon there was a grand parade with lots of beautiful floats and more. It was an exciting experience to be here witnessing history being made. Everyone asks do I notice any differences now that China is in control of Macau. Not really. The only differences so far is that everywhere I go I see Chinese flags. And every now and then I will see a Chinese Army guard stationed somewhere. But that's pretty much the only differences I see. Macau will have its own government for 50 more years. Then the Chinese government will take over.

Christmas Eve was beautiful. It was at the Concordia English Center spoken in Chinese with English writings and interpreted into Macau Sign Language. It was nice to see a lot of Chinese people here learning about Jesus' birth. We spent Christmas day at Pastor Tom Dunseth's home with the Mission team, and I enjoyed celebrating Christmas together.

To welcome the New Year, Rita, Jennifer and I went to Hong Kong and met some other missionaries. It was an exciting experience to be with thousands and thousands of people doing the countdown together. Hong Kong is so different from Macau in so many ways. Macau is more traditional while Hong Kong is so modern in everything. It is so beautiful at night with all the lights from the Peak. It was a nice way to begin the new Millennium.

That sums up the month of December. Remember to keep praying for me as I reach out to the students. Thank you for your continuing support!

Mill Neck Manor High School Students Participate in Mill Neck Foundation for Deaf Ministry Servanthood Project...

The Servanthood Project, a program developed by Mill Neck Foundation, was launched in 1998. It teaches Mill Neck Manor students the importance and value of volunteering to help others. This year, the student team members will be volunteering for 8 hours, during the months of March and April at the Lutheran Family and Community Services' Food Pantry in Hempstead. At the Pantry, two team members, along with Servanthood Team Leader Barbara Lanman, (Mill Neck Foundation's Coordinator of Deaf Ministry), help box up food that is donated by local churches. These boxes are then delivered to needy families by the LFCS staff

Barbara Lanman said, "the visits to the pantry will prepare the team members for the Jamaican Project. The team will be headed to Kingston, Jamaica during the week of May 6-13, where they will be working at the Caribbean Christian Center for the Deaf. They will be helping to construct a school facility for Deaf children from the Kingston area. Lanman says, "This will be a wonderful experience for our students, not only as a way of building self-esteem, but making them aware of how lucky they are to have so much available to them at Mill Neck Manor, unlike other Deaf students in the world." The students selected to be part of this year's Servanthood team are: Jeffrey Blanco, Shameka Edwards, Nelexis Garces, Charmaine Konoski, Michael Powell, John J. Rivera, Nancy Tseng and Victor Urich.

According to Lanman, past Servanthood Projects have proven to strengthen the students' confidence and give them "once in a lifetime experiences." The Projects are funded and directed by the Mill Neck Foundation. This year, Mill Neck Foundation was granted money from the Long Island Lutheran High School Crusader Fund to subsidize a large part of the airfare and room and board costs.

Health Ministry Self-Study for Congregations...

New resource from Wheat Ridge Ministries

ITASCA, IL—The Health Ministry Self-Study for Congregations is a new resource from Wheat Ridge Ministries available free upon request.

"The Health Ministry Self-Study will help congregation leaders assess their congregation's involvement in intentional health ministry," said Dr. Richard Herman, Vice President.

The Health Ministry Self-Study is a process which is selfcontained and can be completed by a team of people. It is designed to help congregations:

- Integrate health ministry into the mission of the congregation
- Identify current health ministry efforts and activities
- Establish on-going evaluation of health ministry
- Envision possibilities for the well-being of the faith community.

"The self-study is easy to use, but also challenges a congregation to pursue excellence in health ministry. Like all assessment tools, the self-study will be most effective when it is done with the knowledge and participation of the entire leadership of the congregation" said Herman.

Congregations may choose to submit the completed selfstudy to Wheat Ridge Ministries, including documentation, if they wish to receive feedback. Wheat Ridge will assign a qualified person to read and provide feedback and suggestions for further developing health ministry in the congregation.

Provided by an anonymous private foundation, a generous \$1 million contribution has been used to establish the Lutheran Crusader Fund, which has a mission "to provide funding for innovative projects that benefit Christian schools, churches, social service organizations, and people in need within their ministry communities." This gift expands the outreach of the Long Island Lutheran High School Association, which is comprised of the 21 Lutheran congregations across Long Island that own and operate the school.

Grant proposals were evaluated by LuHi's LCF Grant Selection Committee. "In a difficult (but joyful) process, over 50 applications were reviewed - a great response to our Fund's first year," stated Executive Director Dr. David Hahn. "Thanks to our wonderful donor and the wise decisions of our investment committee, over \$95,000 will be distributed to 22 worthy ministry projects."

The three principal criteria that were the focus of the committee were: spreading the Gospel, assisting people and/or organizations in times of exceptional need, and creating groundbreaking programs which will serve as a model to be replicated throughout the Church.

Serving Older Adults in Health Ministry

"I believe that God has given me my body and soul, eyes, ears, and all my members, my reason and all my senses, and still preserves them" (First Article of the Creed, Luther's Small Catechism). We acknowledge God as our Creator, and recognize that our whole being is a gift and sacred trust from Him.

Until recently, health was believed to be a fixed state and illness a breakdown of health. Medical doctors and hospitals were believed to be the sufficient agents of a cure. Recent discoveries have changed that perception. Poor relationships, lifestyle choices and spiritual emptiness can contribute to illness, delay cure or even prevent it. Christian lifestyle choices that recognize our bodies as God's gift will raise our well-being to higher levels of health than before enjoyed.

Today, people place great emphasis on total health. Exercise is "in"; proper nutrition is a common topic of conversation; and many people take part in health screenings. Recognizing that healing and health are ultimately the gift of Jesus Christ, the church is asserting a new presence in the health field. It recognizes and gives thanks to Christ for the healing ministry of medical professionals and institutions that seek the cure of the sick. Through prayer, sacrament, ritual, Christian caring and teaching whole-person health, the church brings the healing ministry of Christ into the present.

Older members of the congregation experience diminished physical energies, chronic and acute illness characteristic of their time of life. Specific effort to identify and address the health/illness experience of older members - especially in view of their growing numbers - should be the concern of the congregation.

After a qualitative assessment of needs/opportunities older members are open to (obtained by listening to them) consider the following suggestions:

- Sponsor guided conversation events on topics of interest to them, e.g., normal aging.
- Develop group wellness exercises supported by biblical motivation.
- Create and post a monthly calendar of events for older members, including health events at the local hospital and in the community.
- Sponsor intergenerational events to stimulate social interaction and health in older adults.
- Offer Bible studies that speak to the spiritual issues of older adults to stimulate spiritual growth.

- Periodically conduct services of the Word and prayer in the church for the disabled and homebound, followed by a social hour.
- Offer a pharmacist's presentation on the healing effects and dangerous interactions of drugs commonly taken by older adults. Attendees will bring a list of their prescriptions and the dosage strength of each.
- To alleviate/prevent caregiver stress, periodically invite a group to identify stressors in caregiving, negative effects on family relationships and offer the alternatives of home care or institutional care.

One of the tasks of this group was to describe characteristics of congregations that effectively address the health needs of pastors, teachers, and staff. These characteristics included:

- * regularly discussing and addressing issues related to worker health;
- * affirming and celebrating each person's unique gifts;
- * the congregation's values regarding worker care align with its mission;
- * professional development is supported;
- * people have realistic expectations of pastors, teachers, and staff members;
- * all workers clearly understand their roles and responsibilities;
- salaries and benefits meet or exceed community standards;
- * staff members are empowered and trusted to carry out their duties;
- * an atmosphere of respect and affirmation exists;
- * effective performance review systems are used;
- * peer support is promoted and encouraged;
- * intentional preventive maintenance regarding health
 issues is the norm;
- * planning in the congregation includes concern for worker health issues;
- * effective systems for managing conflict are utilized.

Do any of these characteristics describe your congregation? What could be done to better support the health of your church workers? As you consider these questions, take time to thank God for these dedicated people who serve your congregation!
