Mill Neck Manor Deaf Camp

During the last full week of August, the minds of 18 campers were far away from going back to school. Not quite ready to write those, "What I Did Over My Summer Vacation" essays, children attending Mill Neck Deaf Camp swam, fished, canoed, and got down and dirty – not just from making S'mores, but also from hiking and so much more. The camp, held from August 20 to 26,

Aside from campers and some counselors being Deaf, this camp was like any other sleepaway experience. The first afternoon of camp began with a hike around the campsite to orient campers with the campground. After settling in, campers cooked hot dogs and S'mores around a bonfire to kick off the week of activity. Campers and the five counselors then went around and introduced themselves, their name sign, and said what they wanted to be when they grew up.

The campers, ages 8-12, were from schools for the Deaf, including Mill Neck Manor and White Plains School for the Deaf. This was the eighth year of operation for Mill Neck's Deaf Camp and its third summer at Camp Ma-He-Tu.

Over the week, campers did arts & crafts, played games and did team building activities. Building community was one of the major goals of the camp. Campers were divided into four groups, where each group took turns setting-up and cleaning-up for meals and other tasks, to promote teamwork. "We wanted to show that the focus is that you're here as part of a family," said Barbara Lanman, the camp's director.

Campers played team-building games like "Amoeba" where students, tied together in a huddle with string, had to get from place to place without falling. They also used "Buddy Walkers." Pairs of campers moved in cooperation with one another in order to transport themselves on two planks the size of skateboards without wheels.

The other goal of the camp, in which part of the curriculum is to teach Christian values and beliefs, was to spotlight on forgiveness. For many campers, Mill Neck Deaf Camp was their first time away from home and the first time they spent a significant amount of time with a large group of other people. Campers' nerves and patience were tested at times, but Lanman and Pastor William Wrede, Deaf Mission Developer for the New York Metro area, went over the meaning of forgiveness with campers. One evening, learning more about forgiveness, campers wrote their "sins" on pieces of paper and threw them into a lit fireplace. Throughout the night, while other activities and games went on, campers returned to the fire with more and more pieces of paper to be thrown in.

The end of camp came too quickly. On the last full day of camp, a beautiful clear and sunny day, campers and counselors hiked into the mountains. The kids quickly discovered the freedom and joys of exploring, as they, cautious at first, but then more freely, turned over rocks, climbed, played with bugs and splashed in streams.

Contrasting to the day's energetic activity, the last night was a time of reflection. Campers gathered around a bonfire by the waterfront, and each had a candle standing in a pie plate. Lit with fire from the bonfire's flame, the candles were sent off floating across the water. Symbolic of the campers' "lights" going forth for others to see Lanman hopes that campers will be like the candles and "take what they learned at camp to go out and touch other people's lives."

Campers certainly had much to share about what they learned. On the first day of school at Mill Neck Manor, students readily talked about what they did at camp. Of course, with such a funfilled week, who wouldn't?

Update on Counselor for Deaf Missions

Recently, **Pastor Ron Friedrich** (TX) took over, on a parttime interim basis, Dr. Rynearson's position as Counselor for Deaf Missions. His first memo to the pastors in the field noted that "there is a lot of pain, some from you who are facing uncertainties either in your congregations or in your Districts. Synod staff is also experiencing the pain of cut budgets, reorganization, and layoffs."

Then he requests your prayers, and I think we, as a congregation, should join in these prayers...

"Please pray for each other. And pray for the Church with whom we serve. Paul instructs us to pray for kings and all in authority." This would also include prayer for leadership in the church.

Pray for upcoming District Conventions.

Pray that God would send badly needed volunteer staff for deaf VBS and children's camps.

Pray for your flock.

Pray by name for those who do not yet confess the name of Jesus.

Pray for our students in training for deaf ministry. Pray that more students will become interested in serving the deaf.

Pray for the brothers whose ministries have been curtailed due to physical disabilities.

Pray for the deaf congregations and Districts seeking pastoral leadership (New Jersey, St. Augustine, Rochester, Madison, Des Moines, Maryland).

Pray for guidance to those in authority for the selection of the new Counselor for Deaf Missions."

In September, the Task Force on Deaf Missions met in St. Louis to discuss candidates for the office of Counselor for Deaf Missions. This Task Force presently consists of Rev. Jerry Munz (IN) as Chairman, Rev. Davis Carstens (OR), Mrs. Paula Willig (Interpreter), James Swalley (ILDA President-elect) and Don Peterson (representing teachers). Eight men had been nominated. Several declined. The Task Force debated the merits of each candidate and submitted its recommendations to the Board for Missions. Now this Board will select 2 or 3 candidates to be interviewed, and then a final selection will be made (hopefully soon). What complicates matters is that the person getting this position must not only serve as Counselor to pastors to the deaf throughout the nation, but must also direct the Deaf Institute of Theology (D.I.T.). As D.I.T. Director, he answers to the Seminary, while as Counselor, he answers to the Board for Missions. Pray for him.

Another memo came from **Rev. Daryl Gehlbach**, concerning Eric Plunkett, the student who was killed at Gallaudet recently. Pastor Gehlbach's church had hosted the Minnesota School for the Deaf's baccalaureate service last June, and the victim took an active part in that service. He was a very well-liked young man. Pray for him, and also for the person who killed him.

We are happy to announce that Concordia Theological Seminary (CTS), Fort Wayne, Indiana has a deaf man as a student. There is a great need for pastor to the Deaf. The LCMS has 14 vacancies. Some gentlemen are getting close to retirement. Several have taken calls to hearing churches. There is also a need to train the Deaf to Pastor the Deaf.

Here at CTS, there is three courses in Deaf Ministry which consist in a lot more than just sign language. Deaf Culture and special skills as required for the Deaf are just a few things which are taught in addition to sign language.

This year we have 9 persons in the Deaf ministry class. This is double compared to previous years. We have two others who are planning to take the class. We have four sure committed to being pastors to the Deaf. Our deaf student being one of them.

As you know, Seminary education is expensive. Synod, though established with the objective to train pastors, now regularly cuts the amount given to the Seminaries. At the rate it is going, soon there will be no monies from Synod. Something should be done about this but that is another letter.

I would like to invite any of you, if the Spirit so moves you, to pray about sending a contribution to the Interpreter's Fund c/o CITI, to Concordia Theological Seminary. There are two of us on staff who are interpreters, but we work in other jobs most of the time. Hence we are needing to hire a third person to assist with the interpreting for the Deaf student. Next year we hope to have two Deaf people taking classes. There is a NEED for funding the interpreting at the Seminary.

Homes for Deaf History and Awareness...

On October 26 and 27, 2000, the Friends of Libraries for Deaf Action (FOLDA) and also the Nebraska Commission on the Deaf and Hard of Hearing had their booth during the library conference in Omaha. FOLDA used the theme "Let's Take Deaf History Seriously" for its exhibition.

During the two busy days, many booth visitors took the opportunity to gain insight into and appreciation of the many fine books and ASL videotapes related to deaf history and awareness. A few visitors did take deaf history seriously asking many questions.

They all agreed that library systems in Nebraska, as well as in other rural states, should be encouraged to help preserve deaf history and to show the importance of American Sign Language to the public. Brent Welsch, president of the Nebraska Association of the Deaf, has said that the time is now for the deaf community to show support for local public library systems. Linsay Darnall, Jr, president of the Nebraska School for the Deaf Alumni Association, recognizes the timely urgency of this since the Nebraska legislature recently closed the Nebraska School for the Deaf. Such school students are now mainstreamed with sign language interpreters in their home area.

Actually, it is up to the people of Nebraska to ensure that their local public library systems provide quality resources on these topics and that they effectively serve ALL people in their jurisdictions, regardless of hearing status.

The Nebraska Commission for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing and the Nebraska Library Commission are interested in cooperating to further these goals.

The White House Conference on Libraries and Information Services Task Force (WHCLIST) and the National Commission on Libraries and Information Science (NCLIS) are also counting on both deaf and library communities to come up with practical solutions for the nation's public libraries, to assist them in providing quality library and information services to all people connected with hearing loss and ASL.

FOLDA will keep both deaf and library communities posted.

Incidently, FOLDA will have its exhibition (Table 147) in the Washington Convention Center in Washington, D.C. during the annual midwinter meeting of the *American Library Association on January* 11 *through* 15, 2001. Three FOLDA-USA members, myself, Karen Steffer-Tucker, and Chris Wixtrom, will be exhibitors. Hope to see you there!

This flag was made by widow Mrs. Pickersall and her daughter at the request of Army Major George Armistead who wanted to show the British Navy how strong our Country was by flying the huge flag on the hill by the sea. The original poem was changed to the tune of song we sing. The American Flag is now in American History Laboratory to clean and resew the stitches very fragile material and will be display in the glass case in 2002.
