Summer ... Fall ... Winter ... Spring ... These are the four seasons of the year (although some in

Minnesota would

say the seasons are winter and road-repair). As the seasons come and go, we learn to recognize the signs of change. The leaves fall, the wind seems colder, the sun less warm. We know that winter approaches. The snow melts, the grass turns green, the trees bud. We know that spring is coming.

Jesus warns his listeners to pay attention to the signs of His coming again: wars and rumors of wars, famines, earthquakes and so forth. False prophets will lead many people from faith in Jesus. People will hate and betray one-another.

Lawbreaking shall increase, and people's heart will become unloving and cold. The world will become more and more against Christ and His people.

Our Lord wants us to see these signs and remember that He is coming again. We don't know the day or the time He will appear. He will come the same-as a thief in the night at a time we don't expect. He wants us to see the signs and be ready. This means nourishing our faith with His Word and Sacrament. This means we must be vigilant so that we resist temptation, avoid sin, and follow our Savior.

The signs of His coming also remind us of an urgent task, a task He gives us – sharing the Good News. We must not allow ourselves to sit back and simply wait-for the end. We must be about our Father's business. He desires that no one perish and that all people know the truth. Where is the truth? His Word – His Word is truth.

People must hear God's Word – both Law and Gospel – and especially the Gospel! They must learn of sin and grace. They must hear the wonderful message that Christ died and rose for them. The seed of God's Word must be scattered upon their hearts so that the Holy Spirit can work faith in them.

So what can we do? First, we can share Jesus with other people we know. We don't need to overwhelm them with Bible verses, but we can gently and patiently share the hope within us. Second, we can support our pastors and missionaries both financially and with prayer. Third – and this is most important – we can pray to the Lord of the Harvest that He will send laborers into this field (this world) that is ripe for harvest.

The signs are there. In fact, the signs have been here

since Pentecost, reminding us that Jesus is really and truly coming again. Time is running out. Indeed, the night is coming when no one can work. Yet, we must not allow these signs to make us selfsatisfied or idle. We must not allow the world to mislead us and distract us from our urgent task.

Even as the world seeks to silence us, we must not let fear overwhelm us. The One who died and rose again, He fills us with His Spirit. Thus with His help we can be vigilant and active, doing the urgent task He has given while we await the day of His glorious appearing. Even so, come Lord Jesus!

## What is Happening with Peace Lutheran Church for the Deaf in Indianapolis?

In early spring of 2021, the Indiana District, LCMS contacted the Ephphatha Lutheran Mission Society, ELMS, (an RSO of the LCMS that specializes in Deaf ministry) with a request to spend 1 year revitalizing Deaf ministry in the district. Historically, Deaf ministry in Indiana included the Peace Lutheran Church for the Deaf (PLCD) and mission sites in over 6 cities throughout the state. Pastors Thomas Dunseth and Brant Engel from ELMS worked with retired PLCD pastor Alan Rork to get to know all the former district Deaf mission work and made contact with the mission sites, members of PLCD and the Deaf community in Indianapolis.

During the 12 months, bi-monthly Lutheran Divine Service was held at PLCD and monthly Bible studies at 3 mission sites. Discussions were held with Peace members during this time. At the end of the year, PLCD members decided to sell the Deaf church and move to a local hearing congregation in Indianapolis not far from the Deaf church location. Upkeep of the building had become too expensive and difficult for the aging congregation to maintain. Christ Lutheran church opened its doors for PLCD and in June of this year, members of Peace moved to the new location. Peace Lutheran Church of the Deaf will keep its name and identity as an LCMS Deaf congregation and mission efforts will be conducted from its new home within Christ Lutheran Church.

The Indiana District will continue its support of Deaf ministry, and besides the district, local hearing congregations also pledged their support. What will Deaf ministry look like in Indiana? In May, a deaconess intern from the Deaf ministry program from Concordia Theological seminary was assigned to PLCD and the mission sites. She is fluent in American Sign Language and is a former interpreter from Colorado. After the 1 year internship, PLCD, together with the Indiana District will decide to call a deaconess or pastor to continue Deaf mission in Indiana.

When a homeless shelter was built across the street from Our Savior Deaf Lutheran Church, Madison, WI, in 2021, this seemed like an answer to prayer for the deaf church and members to serve their community in some capacity. Through a series of meetings with different organizations and Madison city officials it came to be that serving meals to those homeless people would be the right fit. Since the homeless would be across the street it would be easy for them to walk over to get a free meal on Sunday evenings. And if they so desired they would also be able to attend worship services since services are

voiced and signed. What an answer to prayer! Sunday evening meals have been prepared and served since February 2022. Rev. Ryan McDermott serves the Madison congregation and feels so blessed that they have this opportunity. Volunteers from the deaf church and nearby hearing churches prepare and serve the food on Sunday evenings. May God continue to bless this ministry!
