### From the Pastoral Advisor Rev. Tyler Walworth



Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

I don't think anyone guessed what one short

month brought us. COVID-19 has shaken us both physically and spiritually. Yet, we know that Christ has come for just this reason, to rid us of fear in the face of sin, death and the devil.

While it may seem opposite to boast in our sufferings, this is exactly what Paul tells us to do in Romans 5, "We boast in our afflictions, knowing that afflictions produce endurance, and endurance produces character and character produces hope and hope does not shame us, for the love of God is being poured into our hearts by the gift of the Holy Spirit."

Are you afflicted? Of course, fear within and without plagues us as we face invisible enemies of germs and loneliness. Then boast that you have the Holy Spirit, who brings the love of God, namely Jesus Christ, who shines in you brightest when you are at your most dependent. Faith is confidence in things not seen. But it is not a foolish confidence. It is confidence in the death and resurrection of Jesus. Do not think that God is unaware of this suffering or that He is not the very one that allows it. He uses this to strengthen you in your hope.

Cling to God in the ways He gives. Cling to Him by His Word, which you will find through your church in the hands of your pastors. You will find it in your Bibles that contain the life giving words of Christ. You will find it in your baptism through prayer, where Christ applies all of His indestructible life to your weak life of sickness and death and overcomes it. These are the ways Christ still comes to us when we cannot physically go to church.

What about the Lord's Supper? Remote communion has become an issue during this crisis. Remote communion is the practice of a pastor blessing bread and wine online or individuals blessing their own bread and wine in their home. This practice confuses the Office of the Ministry and the use of the Lord's Supper. We have many comforts in this time of separation, but remote communion is not one given to us by our Lord. Please refrain from this practice. Our Lutheran Church Missouri Synod and our Seminaries also agree that this practice is not a proper use of the Lord's Supper and should not be done. We will meet again soon, hopefully starting for many in May. If you truly desire the Lord's Supper for your comfort and strength, seek your pastor and ask him to bring it to you or encourage your congregation to start meeting in small groups that abide by health guidelines but allow you to receive this vital food from God.

Christ is still among us and will remain with us until we appear with Him in glory. May your hope grow strong in this time of affliction. Be patient, pray, meditate on God's Word and go to the Lord's Supper at your local church as soon as you can. Our Lord will work this too for our good.

As the world has been impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic, so have Deaf ministries worldwide. The LDMS team has been hard at work

producing and sharing resources with these ministries. At times like this, we are most grateful for the tools available to us through the internet.

We have expanded our video resource directory to include several congregations which now offer worship and Bible study in Sign Language through the internet. These include both Deaf churches and hearing congregations with an oncamera ASL interpreter. You can find these listed on <u>deafjesus.org/</u> <u>worship</u>. (If your church should be added to the list, please let me know.)

Our overseas mission partners in Africa and India have been terribly impacted by COVID-19. Human and social conditions in some locations have gone from bad to worse. Government restrictions and lack of resources make it difficult for the church to serve. At this moment there is very little we can do here to directly help them. Please remember these ministries in your prayers.

Production for our new DeafPah course on **The Life of Martin Luther** is about half done. The response we have received on the video lessons we have released thus far has been overwhelming. The International Lutheran Deaf Association (ILDA) Facebook page also has shared videos and devotions from different individuals and pastors. You can request to join the ILDA page, if you have not yet done so, so that you can access the videos. Every time we pray the Lord's Prayer, we say: "Forgive us our trespasses (sins) as we forgive those who trespass against us." Do we really want God to do that? Or do we say these words only because that is what Jesus taught us to pray?

We all want God to forgive wrong things we have done against Him, but are we so eager to forgive people who have done wrong against us? Or do we let those people live in our heads rent-free while we repeatedly replay our mental video of what they have done to us? Have we collected every one of the verbal rocks they have thrown at us and used those rocks to build a wall of protection?

Early in my ministry I made a monthly visit to a small town where a few Deaf people lived. One of those people was an elderly woman. Every time I visited, she would recite the same story of how the other Deaf in town have hurt her. Then she always ended her story with the same sentence: "But I just forget it." No, she hasn't forgotten. Forgiving is hard.

The message of forgiveness deeply touches the men we serve in prison. Many of them struggle to believe that God has really forgiven them. They struggle to forgive themselves. But many more struggle to release their anger and bitterness against people who have hurt them.

Two famous Christian heros have shared important lessons about forgiveness which they learned through their painful prison experiences.

**Rev. Richard Wurmbrand** was a Lutheran pastor in Romania during World War II. Richard and his wife took advantage of the Nazi occupation to witness to the German troops while they secretly rescued Jewish children. For their efforts, they were often arrested, beaten and nearly executed.

Then at the end of the war, Communists took over the government. The Wurmbrands shared the Gospel with their oppressors, while doing all they could to aid their own oppressed people. Richard was arrested, confined in an underground cell, and tortured for over 14 years.

Besides the routine beatings and torture, prison life was miserable. The cell was dark, cold, and rat infested. Meals consisted of one bowl of thin watery soup a day. Each inmate had one thin blanket — not enough to stay warm.

## Forgive others as quickly as you expect God to forgive you.

During his long ordeal, Wurmbrand sometimes saw his torturers become his cellmate. All it took was a rumor, a negative report, and a faithful Communist officer would be charged with the awful crime of being a secret capitalist.

Once when one of these former torturers lay on his cot in Richard's cell, shivering and crying, Richard felt gratified that his former torturer could experience some of the misery he had previously caused. Then the Holy Spirit spoke to Richard. "If he were Christ, would you give him your blanket?" Richard, ashamed of his own unwillingness to forgive, gave the man his blanket.

**Corrie Ten Boom** learned lessons about forgiveness in a Nazi

concentration camp. Those lessons continued after she was released.

One evening while speaking to a church group about her experiences and the need to forgive, she saw in the audience a man who had been a cruel guard from the prison camp. She just wanted to finish her talk and get away as fast as she could. But people rushed up to shake her hand or ask her questions, including the prison guard she still hated.

When he greeted her, he said, "Can you forgive me for all that I did to you and your sister?" (Corrie's sister Betsy died in the prison camp.) Corrie wanted to scream, "No!" But she knew she must say "Yes." Even though she could not bring herself to forgive him, she knew that Jesus already had forgiven, and she certainly was not holier than Christ!

So in obedience, not because she felt it, she accepted the man's hand and said, "In the name of Jesus Christ, I forgive you." Immediately, all of her anger and hatred melted away, and she saw this man now as a dear brother in Christ.

Like Richard and Corrie, I dislike my own unwillingness to forgive. I pray for the eyes of Joseph, to see those who hurt me as agents of God: "You meant to harm me, but God meant it for good." (Genesis 50:20) I pray for the eyes of Christ to see my enemy's need with His love and compassion. I pray to forgive as God has forgiven me.
